Project Description/Justification:

Illinois Street provides primary access to downtown Fairbanks from the north. Other important travel routes intersect Illinois and Barnette Streets, which add to the travel demands and safety concerns along this corridor. Pedestrian and bicycle facilities are inadequate or entirely absent, and the project supports efforts to address riverfront enhancements in the area where the corridor crosses the Chena River.
