Prior Funding History / Additional Information:

Statewide Contaminated Cleanup has received prior appropriations of 3,789.0 in FY99, 5,000.0 in FY2000, and 5,000.0 in FY2001.

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This capital project will fund the investigation and cleanup of oil and hazardous substance spills that threaten human health or the environment as provided under AS 46.08.040(2)(A). The primary focus of work under this CIP is on sites where uncontrolled hazardous substance contamination threatens or pollutes drinking water supplies, fish, wildlife and subsistence resources, health of school children, and the beneficial use or reuse of state property.

This request can only address the highest of the high priority, most threatening sites. These are the sites for which the state is directly responsible; where a lessor of state land has refused to take appropriate action to address the contamination; where the state has had to close and cleanup leaking underground storage tank sites to meet the 1998 federal deadline; or where the responsible party is unwilling or unable to take appropriate action ("orphan" sites). There are over 160 of these sites that potentially require state funding. This CIP will address the next necessary step (assessment, expedited removal, or cleanup) at approximately 30 sites.

Cleanup work at eligible sites may include a site characterization of the contaminants' source, location, volume, and threat to human health or environment and an expedited removal of contaminated soil and containers of hazardous substances. Based on the result of the site characterization, a cleanup plan will be prepared and executed to clean up the site to a level that is protective of human health and the environment and is safe for its intended use. Long term monitoring is funded where needed to ensure the site cleanup remains effective. Cleanup work will be conducted using private spill response and contamination cleanup specialists under contract to the department. State costs will be recovered, as required by statute, from non-state agency responsible parties.
