Additional Information / Prior Funding History:

None, this is the first year for this project.

Project Description/Justification:

Federal projects take an average of seven years to be bid ready due to federal funding rules. Only currently active design projects, far along, are possible candidates to meet annual federal obligation requirements. Obligation of construction funds requires the project be fully designed, permitted and right-of way certified. It must also be in the STIP.

In federal fiscal year (FFY) 2010, the year-end STIP list of obligated projects changed 75% from the beginning of the year. This is mainly due to project delays; which are caused by environmental and permitting issues, certifying right-of-way which can hold up a major project for years and human resource workloads due to vacancies and increased funding levels since 2006.

It is imperative we have an adequate amount of projects on the shelf in order to address the current and future needs of Alaska, while ensuring Alaska does not lose federal funding through FHWA reallocation to other states.
